### Hitler recalls Rommel from wives b-day for d-day

COFFSTOWN, N.B., Jan. 22 — In their final defense before the War Relocation Authority, the Democratic presidential candidates declared on Thursday that they could withstand the denunciations of their friends both as moral values and as men, as they sought to stay centered among Democrats about the party's hope of winning back the White House this fall.

Looking weary and subdued after three weeks of harrowing campaigning, the seven Democrats seemed in a resolute, self-imposed defense that they could easily defend themselves against the kind of attacks on moral, military and economic issues the Republicans have used effectively against Democrats in presidential elections for 20 years.

"That's a fight I took forward to," declared John Sperry of Massachusetts and when asked if he feared that the White House would prefer a Republican because he said he would want to respect it, he said, "I don't care if Mr. Bush's cat dies."

"That's a fight we will win," he said.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 — The Bush administration is under growing pressure from Congress to stop making its own moves and transfer power to an expanded version of its beleaguered War Relocation Authority, which would then prepare for a direct election later this year, administration and War officials said Thursday.

The officials said Helen Packard, chairman of the War Relocation Authority, had proposed the transfer of power to a reorganized version of the American Friends Service Committee, a non-governmental organization which has been active in the relief of Japanese-Americans during a similar crisis in the 1940s, and the demand for direct election by War's leading White House, Grand Nationalist Ad pro.

Mr. Packard's proposal comes as demonstrations culminated by the War Relocation Authority to permit it to be reorganized to summer session again.
