


Supply Chain Representation

Botticelli, Chart of Hell, c.1480–c.1495. Vat. Lat. 1896. Biblioteca Apostolica Vaticana.




- Only obsolete and hard-to-find parts are counterfeited.




More Myths and Unreliable Facts


- Current surface examination methods using aggressive solvents will reveal evidence of resurfacing and remarking.

Case Study









What me worry?

"If clones are the same as the genuine part, why should I be concerned?" ...

- 1. A "clone" could, in theory, be identical in function and work in the application, but its quality and reliability is unknown.
- A "clone" may be very close in function, but fail performance parameters that may not be detected until the equipment containing the part is used in the field.
- 3. A "clone" is a reversed engineered device and, therefore, presents a potential opportunity for its creator to add unwanted features.
